


















HIDDEN GEMS




With over 600 km of marked trails, Austurland has something for everyone, whether you're seeking a gentle stroll or a challenging multi-day trek.


For adventurers seeking a deeper connection with the wild, multi-day hiking expeditions offer an extraordinary chance to journey through Austurland's untouched landscapes.

EXPLORE STUÐLAGIL & STÓRURÐ

Austurland is home to some of Iceland's most awe-inspiring landscapes, with Stuðlagil Canyon and Stórurð offering two of the region's most spectacular nature experiences. These two destinations, each unique in its own right, promise unforgettable encounters with Iceland's raw beauty.

Stuðlagil Canyon is a geological marvel, famous for its towering basalt columns and the striking turquoise waters of the Jökulsá glacier river. The canyon was hidden beneath glacial waters until 2007, when the construction of the Kárahnjúkar Hydropower Plant reduced the river's flow, unveiling its incredible beauty. Visitors can hike along a well-marked trail that offers sweeping views from above, or take a closer look at the canyon's unique hexagonal formations and vivid turquoise waters from the

Stórurð offers another awe-inspiring adventure. Nestled beneath the towering Dyrfjöll mountain range, Stórurð is a serene landscape of giant moss-covered boulders and crystalclear blue ponds. Its network of hiking trails caters to all levels, providing an immersive journey through one of Iceland's most untouched wilderness areas.








THE PUFFIN CAPITAL

Hafnarhólmi marina in Borgarfjörður eystri




Hafnarhólmi marina, the unofficial puffin capital of Iceland, located in Borgarfjörður eystri, is considered one of the premier birdwatching locations in Iceland. With its thoughtfully constructed wooden platforms and viewing shelters, visitors can safely get within a few meters of puffins without disturbing their nesting sites. This setup ensures an intimate experience while protecting the delicate ecosystem. The local community has made significant efforts to enhance the birdwatching experience at Hafnarhólmi, creating facilities that blend seamlessly with the natural surroundings.


HOME OF THE REINDEER

The Reindeer Park further provides an opportunity to learn about these fascinating animals in a controlled and educational environment.


Spotting reindeer in their natural habitat is often a highlight for visitors, creating unforgettable memories and a deeper connection to Austurland's unique fauna.
